


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Curriculum Highlights

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
Year 1

This Term, our students have been actively practicing breaking apart and adding together groups of objects. By using manipulatives like natural materials, they are able to investigate this concept which contributes to developing a solid understanding of it.

Hands-on activities not only reinforce math skills but also promote critical thinking and collaboration. Students are encouraged to work together, sharing strategies and explaining their thought processes to one another. We invite parents to extend this learning at home with similar activities using everyday objects. Thank you for your support in fostering our students' mathematical growth!

Year 2

The Krsna-Balaram class explored the theme "Me, Connected in Me and My Family" through a self-portrait lesson that focused on both outer and inner selves. Students drew their faces, learning to depict facial features using simple shapes and experiment with expressions like happiness and sadness while using mirrors for observation. They also reflected on their personalities and unique qualities, helping them connect their physical appearance with their deeper identity. This activity fostered artistic skills and self-awareness, allowing for verbal and visual expression. It was a joy to see each student's self-portrait come to life, showcasing their individual identities and talents!





Year 3

In Prabhupada class, we have been focusing on metric measurements in our maths lessons. The students have been actively engaged in learning how to estimate as well as use measuring rulers to determine actual lengths, heights, and widths.

Through a variety of hands-on activities, they've practiced converting between different metric units and have gained a better understanding of how to accurately measure objects around them. It's been fantastic to see the students' enthusiasm as they take on challenges in estimating and measuring!

Year 4

This term in literacy, Year 4 has thoroughly explored various types of poetry and essential poetic devices such as simile and alliteration. Students crafted a range of original poems and participated in a house poetry competition, where they presented their creative shape poems. This experience fostered a sense of community and allowed the children to showcase their writing and performance skills while reinforcing their understanding of poetry. Overall, it has been a rewarding term focused on creativity and literary expression.



Curriculum Highlights

Mi delle & Inter medi tæ School (Yr 3-8)

Year 5

This term, we were learning about the Treaty of Waitangi and its impact on us today. We were fortunate enough to visit a Historical Village, where we got to see what the European settlers lived like from 1840 to 1880. We got to use a slate and slate pencils (made of soapstone or softer slate) and how they used an abacus to learn maths. This helped us compare to what Maori settlements would look like and what their schooling would look like. We continued this theme in our writing and explored a poem called 'Us' Annelies based on the Treaty, She wrote the poem in a mirror format. We learnt how slight changes in words can change the meaning of a text. We got to write haiku, cinquain, and free verse poems based on the treaty and things around us.





Year 6

This term, we explored the significance of the Treaty of Waitangi, focusing on the key themes of promises and protection. We gained a deeper understanding of why the Treaty was created, the different perspectives of M ori and the British, and its lasting impact on Aotearoa New Zealand. Through discussions, research, and creative activities, we discovered why the Treaty remains an important document today. We expressed our thoughts and reflections by writing free verse poems inspired by the themes of unity, identity, and history.

In the final weeks of school, students will be engaging in an art project related to the Treaty of Waitangi, using creativity to reflect on its significance and meaning. It has been a wonderful unit that helped us appreciate the rich history of New Zealand and the importance of honouring agreements.

Year 7

This term, our students embarked on two fascinating journeys of discovery. They delved into the rich history of Polynesian migration, conducting social science inquiries into traditional and modern navigation methods. Students honed their research skills, formulated their own inquiries, and mastered the art of academic report writing. They also explored New Zealand-based texts and engaged in comprehensive comprehension activities. To creatively showcase their learning, students produced a diverse range of artistic expressions, including detailed drawings, intricate clay work, insightful dioramas, and evocative poetry.





Year 8

This term, as one part of our English curriculum, Year 8 have been working hard to refine their writing skills using the Writer's Toolbox tools. They have been learning about sentence structure, exploring different sentence types, and eliminating run-on and incomplete sentences. Students have also been experimenting with various tools, including the Writer's Toolbox online program and interactive Sentence Trains, which help them construct a range of sentence styles. As a result, I can see much improvement in their writing, and am excited to see how this flows into other curriculum areas.

Curriculum Highlights

Hi kg School Subjects





English

In Year 9 English students have been studying war poetry. Students posed as interviewers and famous poets, creating questions and answers for a podcast or live interview with a poet. The students' interviews were not only entertaining and creative but reflected their knowledge and understanding of the purpose, themes and use of language in some famous war poems. They also wrote some great poems: a memory poem based on events in their life, a narrative poem about Krishna's pastimes and black out war poems.

In Year 10 students have been studying journey poems and writing postcard narratives and poems based on the journey theme. They are now studying formal writing to prepare for their NCEA literacy co-requisite exam.

In English, Year 11 students have been studying to become "expert" at identifying and understanding a context and explaining how this influences verbal language use. They have studied the language of identity in the sastra context, in the Maori context, the Pacific context and other contexts from around the world. In doing so, they have considered the perspectives and issues of different cultures as well as their own.

Maths

In Year 9 Maths, students focused on statistics, utilizing a Statistical Enquiry cycle to analyze data, including dinosaur information from the Dinos of Patagonia exhibition at Te Papa Museum 2024. They successfully compared the weights of plant-eating and meat-eating dinosaurs and are currently studying number strategies.

In Year 10 Maths, students explored various data sets using statistical methods, including the Olympic Triathlon database from the 2020 Olympic Games. They are now preparing for their NCEA Numeracy co-requisite exam.

In Year 11, students employed statistical methods to analyze Census at School data, comparing travel times to school for years 9-13 across Auckland, Canterbury, Wellington, and the South Island. They also examined screen time differences between male and female students in NZ and are preparing for their NCEA Numeracy exam.




Seni roSchool Subjects

Art and Technology



This term, our Year 11 students have been immersed in a dynamic art project aimed at designing a unique art book. They have been capturing photographs of locations that inspire them, such as the ISKCON farm area, skateboard parks, and beautiful gardens, which they will translate into drawings and paintings.



In our technology lessons, students have been exploring the exciting world of design through computer-aided tools and 3D printing. The Year 9 students focused on creating functional desk tidies and personalized pencil cases, which they skillfully decorated to reflect their individual styles. Meanwhile, the Year 10 students took their creativity up a notch by developing impressive architectural designs. They embraced the opportunity to see their concepts come to life, utilizing modern manufacturing techniques and experiencing the thrill of transforming ideas into tangible products.

Sastra



In Year 9, Sastra students learned about Open Eyed Meditations, focusing on the balance between analysis and overanalysis, while drawing lessons from Rama and Arjuna and sketching Lord Nityananda's life.

In Year 10, students explored the Magic of Friendships, comparing a shloka about loving exchanges to modern relationships. They created visuals of Lord Chaitanya and Lord Nityananda and performed kirtan and skits based on this topic.



Science

Year 11 recently embarked on an exciting and hands-on exploration of local weed species, using quadrats to observe and measure their types and abundance. Equipped with the quadrats they thoughtfully crafted themselves, along with measuring tapes and clipboards, the students collaborated in teams to identify various weed plants within designated areas. This engaging activity not only fostered teamwork but also gave them valuable experience in ecological research techniques. It's been a wonderful opportunity for them to bring classroom learning to life through real-world application.

The primary goal of this field research was to deepen their understanding of the biodiversity in our local ecosystem and explore how different weed species affect the surrounding environment. By analysing the data collected, students gained insights into the prevalence of specific weeds and considered their impact on managing the school's paddock.

Technology and Outdoor classroom

In our outdoor class, students have been actively engaged in gardening and sampling fresh vegetables. They have successfully grown Snow Peas, which will be ready for harvest next term, along with Sweetcorn, which has just begun to flower. The students relished tasting fresh rhubarb, celery, and mint drizzled with a touch of honey. Everyone is eagerly anticipating the upcoming opportunity to plant potatoes, adding even more excitement to their gardening experience.



In our recent project, Year 7 students engaged in an exciting hands-on activity where they constructed intricate temple models using card and air-drying clay. The students began by carefully cutting and assembling the basic structure from flat card to create the foundational shape. They then showcased their creativity by crafting detailed spires and decorative elements using the clay. The final touch was the application of paint, which truly brought their designs to life, resulting in impressive and visually striking temple models that reflected their artistic talents.

Sanskrit

The Sanskrit program at the school has continued progressing smoothly this term. Year 8 has now joined the growing community of Sanskrit learners and has even begun translating simple sentences into Sanskrit.

This term, the primary focus for all classes is mastering the Devan gar script, with special emphasis on writing the alphabet.

Additionally, all lessons, including poems and songs, are accompanied by instructional videos, with links provided to the students. Parents are encouraged to support their children in watching these videos, as they offer a valuable immersion experience that enhances understanding and accelerates language learning.





Physical Education

This term in PE, we dived into the exciting world of striking and hitting games! From cricket to T-ball and other bat-and-ball activities, we honed our hand-eye coordination, teamwork, and strategic thinking. Each session challenged us to master techniques like timing our strikes, aiming for accuracy, and working collaboratively to outplay the opposing team. Along the way, we celebrated individual progress, cheered for group achievements, and most importantly, had a ton of fun! It's been a term full of energy, skill-building, and unforgettable moments on the field.

This celebration honoured the Lord while fostering unity within our school community and reinforcing our commitment to His teachings. Thank you to everyone who participated and supported this meaningful event!
















Poetry Recital-The first house event of the year
